
Voting for write-in candidates

How to vote for a person not listed on the ballot


Write the name and office of the official write-in candidate in the “write-in” portion of the ballot. You can request a list of “Qualified Write-in Candidates” from a pollworker or visit lavote.net.

You may not write-in a candidate and vote for a candidate on the ballot for the same office.

Information for voters

All voters can now vote in the Statewide Direct Primary Election, regardless of party preference.

About primaries in California

(The Top Two Candidates Open Primary)

- 1** The Primary is a nonpartisan election. This means the candidate is not nominated by the party. If the candidate has a preferred political party, the party name appears on the ballot for information only.
- 2** All the candidates appear on one ballot. Any voter can vote for the candidate of their choice.
- 3** The two candidates with the most votes will move on to the General Election in November.

The Federal Voting Rights Act requires voter information, including a sample ballot booklet containing a Vote By Mail application be available in English as well as Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog/Filipino, Japanese, Thai, Khmer and Hindi.



Apply to Vote By Mail

Vote By Mail

You can request a ballot by mail starting 29 days before the Election. Apply by doing one of the following:

- Visit **lavote.net** and submit your request online.
- Tear off and mail back the application on the back cover page of this booklet.
- Send a letter signed by the voter that includes the voter's residence address and where to send the Vote By Mail ballot:

Permanent Vote By Mail

You can request a ballot to be mailed to you automatically every time there is an election. This is called Permanent Vote By Mail status. California law allows a voter to declare that they want to automatically vote by mail every election.

Your voted ballot must be received by 8 pm on Election Day.



Voter Bill of Rights

1. **You have the right** to cast a ballot if you are a valid registered voter. A valid registered voter means a United States citizen who is a resident of this state, who is at least 18 years of age and not in prison or on parole for conviction of a felony, and who is registered to vote at his or her current residence address.
2. **You have the right** to cast a provisional ballot if your name is not listed on the voting rolls.
3. **You have the right** to cast a ballot if you are present and in line at the polling place prior to the close of the polls.
4. **You have the right** to cast a secret ballot free from intimidation.
5. **You have the right** to receive a new ballot if, prior to casting your ballot, you believe you made a mistake. This includes voters at the polls and Voting By Mail.
6. **You have the right** to receive assistance in casting your ballot, if you are unable to vote without assistance.
7. **You have the right** to return a completed Vote By Mail ballot to any precinct in the county.
8. **You have the right** to election materials in another language, if there are sufficient residents in your precinct to warrant production.
9. **You have the right** to ask questions about election procedures and observe the election process. You have the right to ask questions of the precinct board and elections officials regarding election procedures and to receive an answer or be directed to the appropriate official for an answer. However, if persistent questioning disrupts the execution of their duties, the board or election officials may discontinue responding to questions.
10. **You have the right** to report any illegal or fraudulent activity to a local elections official or to the Secretary of State's Office.

If you believe you have been denied any of these rights, or you are aware of any elections fraud or misconduct, please call the Secretary of State's confidential toll-free voter hotline at 1-800-345-VOTE (8683).

Voter-Nominated Offices

All voters, regardless of the party preference they disclosed upon registration, or refusal to disclose a party preference, may vote for any candidate for a Voter-Nominated or Nonpartisan office. The party preference, if any, designated by a candidate for a Voter-Nominated office is selected by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party or that the party approves of the candidate. The party preference, if any, of a candidate for a Nonpartisan office does not appear on the ballot.

Write-In Candidates

A voter is entitled to cast a vote for a qualified Write-in candidate for any Voter-Nominated office by writing, on the Write-in portion of the ballot, the name and office of the qualified candidate. See Pollworker for a list of qualified candidates.

CITY ATTORNEY’S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE W

This measure seeks voter approval of Ordinance 3011, which would amend the City Charter concerning the method and manner of election of members to the Whittier City Council.

The City Charter, adopted by Whittier voters in 1957, currently calls for elections of five City Council members by all City voters (at large) to terms of four years each, staggered so that three are elected in one election year and two are elected in the next. The Mayor is currently selected by the five Council members each year on a rotating basis. The Mayor is the presiding officer of the City Council, executes ordinances, resolutions and agreements on behalf of the City, has primary responsibility for interpreting city policy and programs to the people, and has other duties provided in state and city laws. The Mayor has the same voting power as the other City Council members.

The proposed measure, placed on the ballot by the City Council, would change this system to “district-based elections,” a method of electing members to the City Council by districts. A candidate must reside within an election district and is elected only by voters residing within that district.

Under the proposed ordinance, the City would be divided into four geographic districts equal in population according to the latest federal decennial census. Factors which may be considered in creating the districts are: (1) topography, (2) geography, (3) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory, and (4) community of interest of the districts. Cal. Elec. Code § 21620. Four Council Members would be chosen by this district method for four-year terms. The Mayor would be directly elected by all City voters, for a two-year term. This new manner of electing the Mayor would not change the powers of the Mayor, which remain the same as currently provided in the City’s charter and ordinances.

Elections would continue to be staggered so that every two years, two Council Member seats and the Mayor’s seat will be up for election. The measure does not specify the exact manner of drawing districts, which would be done in accordance with state law. After the initial establishment of the districts, the district boundaries would be modified, if necessary, every ten years so that each district continues to be as nearly equal in population as may be according to the latest federal decennial census.

A “yes” vote on this measure would approve Ordinance No. 3011, which changes the current city-wide at-large election system to a district election system, allowing the creation of four districts, from which one council member would be elected by voters of each district, and the Mayor would be directly elected by all voters city-wide to serve for a two-year term.

A "no" vote on this measure would leave in place the current charter provision which provides for five Council Members, elected by all voters city-wide, for staggered terms of four years each, with the Mayor selected by the council rather than elected, currently on an annual basis under Council policy.

This Charter Amendment will modify our election system so that four Council members will be chosen in district elections and the Mayor will be chosen by all city voters.

This is the best solution for Whittier.

Here’s why:

It’s practical. In a Mayor plus Council District election system, the Mayor represents all voters and each Council Member represents a specified district. More and more cities, including Pasadena, use this system because it works — and it works well.

It’s balanced. The Mayor plus Council District system blends the best of two election systems, ensuring genuine neighborhood representation for citizens in the four districts, while preserving a Mayoral position that answers to all city residents.

It’s fair. The current City Council is dedicated to equal treatment for everyone. That will not change under this new system. In fact, it promises to increase the responsiveness of local government as a wide variety of good people from throughout Whittier are elected to continue our proud history.

It resolves what is likely to become a divisive and expensive debate. A looming court battle over representation threatens to drain millions in city funds that should be used to meet the needs of Whittier citizens.

Rather than engage in a costly disagreement over which of two honorable election systems is better, we can move forward by approving Mayor plus Council District elections.

Let’s get back to focusing on what is really important – electing good candidates that will guide Whittier into a bright future.


