MINUTES CITY OF WHITTIER SOCIAL SERVICES COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING WHITTIER POLICE DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY ROOM 13200 PENN STREET TUESDAY, MAY 7, 2019 – 6:30 P.M.

1. CALL TO ORDER

The Social Services Commission of the City of Whittier met in Regular Session in the Whittier Police Department Community Room, 13200 Penn Street, Whittier, California. Chair Enriquez-Santos called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

2. ROLL CALL

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner McDonnell led the Pledge of Allegiance to the United States flag.

4. PUBLIC COMMENTS

None

5. STAFF REPORTS

5. A APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

It was moved by Commissioner Barrett, seconded by Commissioner McDonnell, and carried 3 – 0 (Absent: Vice Chair Luevano and Commissioner Illingworth) to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of April 2, 2019 as presented.

5. B 2019-2020 WHITTIER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM-SPONSORED BY ATHENS SERVICES AND REPUBLIC SERVICES

Community Services Manager Browne, reviewed the scholarship criteria and essay requirements. He noted that he had vetted each essay regarding confirmation of City of Whittier residency, and required essay word count. Prior to review by Commission, students' identifying information was removed; essays were divided by waste service

provider, and assigned a number. Six essays were submitted in the Athens Services group for five, \$500 scholarships, and five in the Republic Services group for five, \$500 scholarships.

Chair Enriquez-Santos voiced her concerns regarding the scholarship program being available only to City of Whittier residents. Commissioner Barrett questioned which schools the applicants attend, noting the differences in the quality of writing and grammar between the various essays. Commissioner McDonnell stated that she reviewed the essays by first looking at the thought process and ideas of each student, then grammar and writing quality. Commission agreed that one of the essays submitted in the Athens Services group was not of the same caliber as the other five essays, and would therefore not receive a scholarship. Commissioner McDonnell voiced her concerns about how this one individual would be notified. Commission determined that all five essays submitted in the Republic Services group would receive scholarships, and essay numbers 1,2,3,5 and 6 in the Athens Services group would receive scholarships.

It was moved by Commissioner Barrett, seconded by Commissioner McDonnell, and carried 3-0 (Absent: Vice Chair Luevano and Commissioner Illingworth) to approve the scholarship winners as #'s 1-5 for Republic Services, and #'s 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6 for Athens Services.

5. C UPDATE ON CITY OF WHITTIER HOMELESS PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

Community Services Manager Browne reported on the recent actions to clear encampments at Parnell Park, and on the Whittier Boulevard Greenbelt. He noted that there were 30 individuals at Parnell Park who were offered various referrals for assistance and housing. The effort was accomplished with the support of multiple agencies and service providers. It was peaceful, well done, and professionally handled. Hazmat remediation was required as part of this project. Cal Trans, the California Highway Patrol, and multiple agencies also recently cleared the encampment from the Whittier Boulevard Greenbelt. There were approximately 41 people and 35 tents on the property. Los Angeles County Supervisor, Janice Hahn, provided funding for the hotel/motel vouchers, and Whittier First Day provided food, clothing and various services. Community Services Manager Browne noted this is a short-term and expensive solution. Commissioner McDonnell questioned what happened with the person who had been advertising tents, with solar panels, for rent. Community Services Manager Browne replied this is his business and works in other local cities. He was issued with a 72-hour 'notice to leave' prior to the main clean-up and was gone before the main cleanup took place. Community Services Manager Browne stated this person also has recreational vehicles for rent, to the homeless, in the region.

Community Services Manager Browne reported the City is re-applying for the Measure H grant for \$300,000 for hotel/motel vouchers and master subleasing of homes to provide temporary housing. He noted there was \$6 million in funding available and 40 cities competing for the grants funds. It was also noted that receipt of approved funding is very slow in coming. The \$272,000 Whittier was awarded in January 2019 has yet

to be received. Staff continues to receive calls about individual camping sites which are now spread throughout the City. The County sends housing navigator teams to engage the parties, however, the "next step" (housing) is missing and there is not a lot of forward motion for any long-term solutions. Whittier's City Manager, Jeff Collier, is part of a group of City Managers, from the Gateway Cities Council of Governments (Gateway COG), who are discussing possible locations to be used for housing. Community Services Manager Browne reported that the "point in time" count figures would be coming out at the end of May.

It was moved by Commissioner McDonnel, seconded by Commissioner Barrett, and carried 3 – 0 (Absent: Vice Chair Luevano and Commissioner Illingworth) to receive and file the update on City of Whittier Homeless Plan implementation.

6. SECRETARY COMMENTS

Community Services Manager Browne announced the following:

- The Whittier Community Foundation is presenting their annual fundraising event, "Dancing with the Whittier Stars" on Wednesday, May 8, 2019, at the Community Center. There will be shows at 4:00 and 7:00 p.m. Funds raised will be going to the fire fighter tribute art piece.
- Founders Day will be celebrated on Saturday, May 11, 2019 at Central Park. This event will include various displays, demonstrations, youth groups, and entertainment.
- The Rio Hondo Symphony (Whittier Regional Symphony) will hold their last concert of the season on Sunday, May 12, 2019.
- Whittier will celebrate "Bike to Work Day" on Thursday, May 16, 2019, from 7:00 a.m. until 9:30 a.m. There will be stations set up on the Greenway Trail at Palm Park and at City Hall, with giveaways, refreshments, information, and raffle prizes (for those attending with a bicycle).
- The annual Whittier Police Department Open House, Health Fair and Kiddie-K Fun Run will be held on Saturday, May 18, 2019 from 9:00 a.m. until noon, in front of City Hall. There will be tours of the Police station, Fire Department participation, healthy life style information, and climbing wall, and more. The Kiddie-K Fun Run will start at 10:00 a.m. This is a free event.
- Memorial Day will be observed on Monday, May 27, 2019 at 9:00 a.m., at the City Hall Peace Memorial. There will be an honor guard, Boy Scout participation, a school band and speakers.
- Movies in the Park will begin on Saturday, June 1, 2019, at Parnell Park. The movie being shown is "Christopher Robin".

- The Senior information and Referral Fair will take place on Thursday, June 6, 2019, 9:00 a.m. 12 noon, at the Whittier Senior Center on Walnut Street. There will be 50+ vendors with information and resources regarding senior healthcare, legal assistance, housing, transportation, and more. There will also be health screenings, and Veteran's assistance.
- The 2019 Summer Concerts in the Park series begins on Monday, June 24, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. at Central Park. Thursday night concerts begin on June 27, 2019 at Parnell Park.

At the July 24, 2018 City Council Meeting, Council adopted the City of Whittier Homeless Plan.

The homeless plan provides a framework, and establishes four goals with supporting action items, for preventing and combatting homelessness over the next three years. The plan includes key supporting actions the City has undertaken to improve existing services and programs, increase service access, identify and strengthen local and regional partnerships, and provide outreach and information to the community regarding homelessness. The plan includes ideas from the two consultants who worked on the plan, Whittier Police Department, Whittier First Day, Social Services Commissioners, and comments from the community meetings, community surveys, and stakeholder interviews. The plan recognizes the need for additional resources to address the homeless issues in the City, and to provide information to the community on the work being done. Metrics for each goal have been set, as appropriate, in coordination with the County and homeless prevention experts over the course of the life of the plan.

RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file the Community Services Division's presentation focusing on Sports and Facilities.

BACKGROUND

The Sports and Facilities Division oversees sports programs including both youth and adult sports, theater programming, and facility rentals which include field rentals, rooms at the Whittier Community Center, Whittier Transportation Center, and Whittier Center Theater. The division also oversees all equipment within the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department. The City of Whittier has 10 youth Sports organizations, which in total serves over 4,000 youth annually. The Sports and Facilities Division serves as the liaison between the local school districts and all the youth sports leagues. The Whittier Adult Softball Program is the highlight of the division running three successful programs a year averaging 65 teams per season with all games played at York Field. The division directly oversees Whittier Family Theater, which performs 3 - 4 shows per year with approximately 150 -175 youth participating per show. The Sports and Facilities Division oversees all equipment and assists various groups with their equipment needs throughout the year, including the Whittier Chamber of Commerce, Whittier Uptown Association, and Boy & Girls Club.
