MINUTES ART IN PUBLIC PLACES ADVISORY COMMITTEE REGULAR MEETING CITY HALL, 13230 PENN STREET MARCH 24, 2021 – 4:30 P.M.

1. CALL TO ORDER

The Art in Public Places (AIPP) Advisory Committee met in Regular Session at City Hall, 13230 Penn Street, Whittier, California. Chair Eric Martinez called the meeting to order at 4:37 p.m.

2. ROLL CALL

3. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Chair Korporaal led the Pledge of Allegiance to the United States flag.

4. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Consistent with Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-29-20, public comment options were made available to the public for participation by email and voicemail. Office Specialist III Rodriguez was to forward correspondence to Commission for review.

Office Specialist III Rodriguez reported no public comments were received.

5. STAFF REPORTS

5.A. Approval of Minutes

It was moved by Member Murray, seconded by Member Hahn, and carried 5 – 0 (Absent: Members Marilyn McCarty and Octavio Martinez) to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of September 23, 2020.

5.B. Art in Public Places Master Plan Updates

Manager Hamilton reviewed the recommendations made by the Committee at the previous meetings and addressed questions they wished for Staff to follow up on. The Committee inquired if it is necessary to reassess the amount a developer would pay, (currently at one half of one percent) in-lieu of installing artwork, to represent the current economy. They also recommended revising the total value of residential project costs that determine if developers are required to acquire and install artwork to fit the current economy per the ordinance.

Manager Hamilton responded, stating the Community Development department did not think we needed to change the amount a developer would pay in-lieu of installing artwork because it is a percentage of the project and would still be appropriate to use. She continued stating the threshold could be changed to fit the current financial climate, and that this can be recalculated with the help of Community Development Staff. This would also mean a change to the Ordinance which would need to be submitted with the revisions to the Master Plan.

Staff then addressed the Appendices that were requested by the Committee. These would be working documents that could be updated and revised regularly. Appendix A is the updated list of sites to catalog all the locations that have already been considered, Appendix B would be designated as the sites in which the Committee would recommend for future projects, and Appendix C would be the inventory of sites in which artwork is completed and displayed throughout the City.

The Committee was thankful for the clarification given by the Community Development department regarding their questions on fees and the ordinance. Also, the Committee was satisfied with the outcome of the Appendices and agreed that creating a flexible document would be beneficial.

It was motioned by Member Hahn, seconded by Member Rowe to move the recommended revisions of the Art in Public Places Master Plan to the Cultural Arts Commission for further review, 5-0. (Absent: Members Octavio Martinez and Marylin McCarty)

6. SECRETARY COMMENTS

Secretary Santana updated the Committee on the progress of the Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Memorial Honoring Jose Ramos art piece. The piece is in the first stages of preparing screens for the firing of the tile work. The Committee also received an update on the York Field art project "Freedom." The wax molds are currently at the foundry ready for the pouring of metal. We are hopeful to have both art pieces in place in late.

Supervisor Arismendez updated the Committee on submissions for the Street Banner Program. Several pieces have been received. The Selection committee will meet soon to choose up to 120 artists to replicate their artwork onto a seven or nine-foot banner.

Secretary Santana announced the Community Golden Egg Hunt has commenced as a scavenger hunt for the community. Staff is preparing for an in-person "It's a Spring Thing" event that will have activities families can participate in. The City is also planning on having a Fourth of July firework event. The Chalktastic event has been moved to a later date and planning is underway.

Manager Hamilton communicated that youth sports and adult softball are coming back, and we will be providing a new virtual brochure to help update the community of what programs and activities are available.

Supervisor Arismendez explained that schools are reopening in phases and our Wyn Club after school programming will be returning to school sites.

Secretary Santana stated after communicating with Art Forms we are looking into partnering with them and looking at potential space for their outdoor classes. They have also offered to assist with the Street Banner Program.

7. COMMITTEE MEMBER COMMENTS AND CONFERENCE REPORTS

Member Hahn commented that the SFS Art Fest was moved to November. She mentioned she had spoken at a meeting about teaming up with the City to get artwork for the barricades in Uptown Whittier. She is hoping the AIPP Advisory Committee can be a resource for some of the art projects currently being prepared. She stated she would be happy to support Art Forms in any way that she can.

Member Murray commented he is thankful for the meeting and ready to move forward. He is ready to get some more fantastic art throughout the City.

Member Rowe commented she is pleased with the progress that has been made.

Member Korporaal commented Friends of Uptown is preparing for Art Strolls to possibly begin again on Wednesdays in June. Also, that Friends of Uptown is in the beginning stages of getting a mural up in Uptown Whittier.

Chair Martinez commented he is glad to see the movement of the Art in Public Places Master Plan and excited to see the new projects come out. He asked Staff what tasks are next for the AIPP Advisory Committee.

Secretary Santana informed the Committee of their next assignment, begin discussions on the next potential Art Project.

8. ADJOURNMENT

Chair Martinez adjourned the meeting at 5:12 PM.

RECOMMENDATION

Review and recommend to the Cultural Arts Commission additional sites for placement of public art to the Art in Public Places Master Plan.

BACKGROUND

The Art in Public Places Master Plan originally approved by City Council in 2004 and includes a listing of designated sites for placement of community art. (Attachment A) Since 2004 the sites listed have either been used for art placement or are no longer available.

In 2016, the Art in Public Places Advisory Committee was reestablished, and the Committee began work on curating art for the community. In doing so, they discovered the need to revisit the designated sites for art pieces and found that several sites had been utilized for art placement and other sites were no longer viable locations.

DISCUSSION

At its August 26, 2020 meeting the Committee continued discussions on updating the designated site list with the intentions of listing additional potential sites. Several locations were identified (Attachment B). Due to the undertaking of the revisions to the entire Master Plan, the Committee unanimously agreed to postpone their discussions of adding potential sites to the designated site list to a later meeting.

Now that the Master Plan is awaiting Council consideration, potential sites for new art pieces can be reviewed and discussed.


